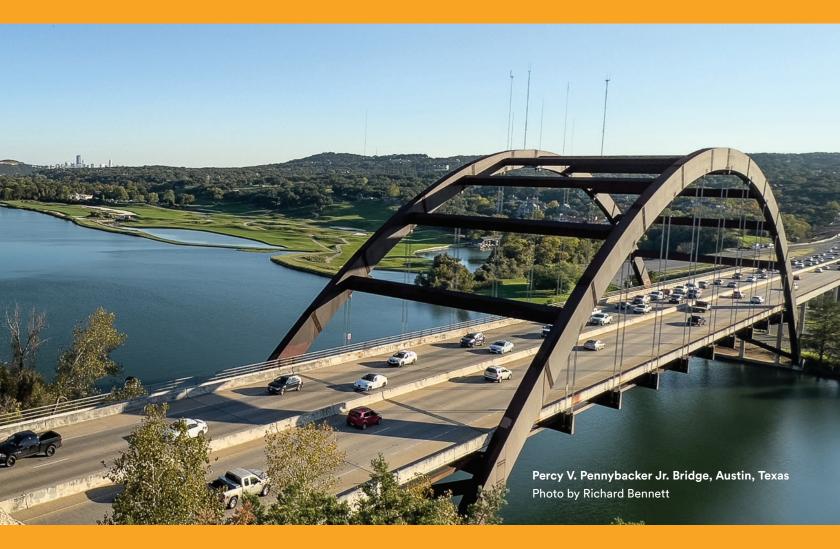

From the Pages of Bill's Notebook

When training to become a lifeguard as a teenager, I thought it would be easy. I said to myself, "Self, you are on the swim team. You have been swimming all your life. You spent hours and hours playing in the pool. How hard can it be, right?" I would soon find out how hard this would be. We first went through the workbook and training manual. While reading the material I would think, "I can do that and that." We would practice in the pool each week, and eventually we were able to do the in-water test. Our first task was to swim 500 yards. We were told to keep a slow and steady pace, because after finishing we would be expected to tread water for 10 minutes. This part was particularly difficult for me at the time because I had about half the body fat I do now. Body fat apparently makes you more buoyant, so without a lot of it I sank like a rock. By this time in the water test, I was breathing really hard. Then came time for the "distressed swimmer" portion. For this we had to pretend to jump in and save someone who was pretending to drown. We were told to approach the swimmer while reassuring him. To make this realistic, this large man began to try to hold on to my head under water to try keep his head above water. We were told to take a large gulp of air and go under the water, which makes the person let go of you because they want to stay on top of the water. I didn't get enough air, but I still had to continue to do the next step, where you come around to the back of the victim underwater, swim to the surface and put them in a cross chest (think headlock but over their chest and under their arm). Then you had to calmly reassure them and swim them to shore using only your legs. I was panting so hard I couldn't talk at all, much less calmly. Thankfully, I was able to grip the swimmer tightly enough that when he started to thrash again he stopped trying to fight against me and let me bring him to the pool's edge. I got out of the pool and almost passed out. I never had to swim, tread, and rescue anyone before. I had just caught my breath and the instructor threw some heavy weights into the deep end and instructed me to go and bring them back up. Somehow, I gathered enough stamina to will myself through the exercise. This was it. I had finished the tests, both written and water, and now I was a lifeguard. When I looked back to see how difficult they had made this training, I realized why. If I was a "distressed swimmer" in need of rescue, I would want someone who could pass a difficult test be the one to come after me, not someone who had just played in the pool.

The Apostle Paul told his protégé Timothy that those who serve in the church need to be trained and tested. He wanted to make sure that when the persecution and difficult situations come, that leaders would be ready to help those in their care. He says, "In the same way, deacons (servants) are to be worthy of respect, sincere, not indulging in much wine, and not pursuing dishonest gain.

They must keep hold of the deep truths of the faith with a clear conscience. They must first be tested; and then if there is nothing against them, let them serve as deacons" (1 Timothy 3:8-10). If you are being tested, be thankful. God may be strengthening you so you can help someone else.

Hang in there people! God is glad to be with us! I'm praying for us all!

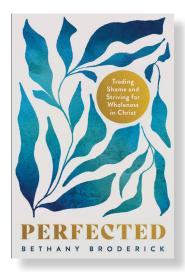

Perfected: Trading Shame and Striving for Wholeness in Christ by Bethany Broderick

Bethany Broderick is a speaker, writer, and a professor of marketing. She has written for *The Gospel Coalition*, *Risen Motherhood*, *Journey Women*, *Christian Parenting*, and more. Broderick lives with her husband and three children in Birmingham, Alabama. Broderick says that she is a recovering perfectionist. On her website she says, "I am passionate about helping women find freedom from their-self condemning shame and self-righteous striving so they can experience wholeness through the finished work of Christ."

A question that many women wrestle with is, "Am I good enough?" In *Perfected*, Broderick tackles this question that she has dealt with in every stage of her life. "No matter how much I did, it never seemed enough." She uses examples from her own story and hopes that by reading this book you will learn how to walk freely in Christ's perfection. The book is written in three parts: The Lies, The Truth, and The Promise. Part 1- The Lies, discusses Satan's lies that hold us captive and how to use the truths in Scripture to fight those lies. Part 2 – The Truth, includes a of study of the right view of God, the right view of ourselves, and the right view of salvation. Part 3 – The Promise, focuses on the promises of God pointing us to assurance of faith, enduring hope, love-motivated good works, and Biblical community. Each chapter ends with a Remember, Reflect, and Read section. Broderick encourages you to identify the lies, meditate on the truth, and live according to the promises of God. She says, "I pray that the next time you wonder if you are good enough, you will hold fast to a better truth: I am perfected in Christ."
